
The homicide rate declined 48% from 1993 to 2011

Since the NCVS interviews victims of crimes, homicide is not included in nonfatal victimization estimates. Homicide rates are based on data from the Center for Disease Control's Vital Statistics System.¹ From 1993 to 2011, the rate of homicide declined 48%, from 9.9 to 5.1 homicides per 100,000 persons (figure 2). Over the past 10 years, from 2002 to 2011, the rate declined from 6.1 to 5.1 homicides per 100,000, with the majority of the decline occurring from 2008 to 2011.

¹The CDC's Vital Statistics are one of two national sources of data on homicide victimization. Rates of homicide are also available through the FBI's Supplemental Homicide Report (SHR). Rates of homicide may differ slightly depending on which source is used.
